She applied at the Chicago Tribune to be a copygirl but was told **"we only take copyboys."** After marriage and 7 children, upon moving to Madison, WI, Mary Ann went back to school earning bachelor and masters degrees in Political Science at the University of Wisconsin.

She became the first woman in the state to be a lobbyist, working for a Milwaukee firm as well as volunteering her skills for Catholic causes. Over the decades she led multiple Catholic organizations in West Bend and Madison including raising money to build St. Francis Cabrini in West Bend. Mary Ann was asked to be the first woman lector at Queen of Peace Parish after Vatican II. Mary Ann started blogging in the 80's and read 3 newspapers a day until just days before her death in February 2019! (Information from Mary Ann's obituary.)

3 cups flour 1/2 Tsp yeast with 1-1/4 cups warm water 1 tsp salt

In fact, my mother often prepared food for the bereaved family suffering a loss at our funeral home. It was her personal way to lessen their pain through her cooking skills. I became the expert clean-up queen, not quite like Cinderella, though.

Our son from DC with 2 of his daughters, came last week for various reasons. We loaded his car with 39 scrapbook albums compiled over 59 years of marriage. He kindly accepted a new home for these treasures. These sweet memories remind us of the roads we traveled, people we loved, and people in our lives.

These photo albums also remind us that kids are valued, respected and cherished. Their stages of growth are preserved through pictures. I spent hours, years, tears and time to capture those trips, events, holidays, and poses. Each reminds me that life was full, complete, eventful and meaningful. Yes, I was a "Scrapbookaholic", a compulsive parent who always found fun compiling memories to remember and document.

The test of memory began when we paged through and couldn't remember names but the events always made a mark. Nostalgia is good for the brain and heart to grow and flourish. At various times in my career I volunteered, served on the board and worked as an employee of **Erie Neighborhood House**, becoming a first-hand witness of the good work done there in 50 of its 150 years. So, I wrote from that perspective, coming to believe that theirs was a story worth telling.

In this book, you will meet generations of Presbyterian church volunteers who came to help and were transformed themselves. You will learn about organizations Erie helped create and support in their early years that are, today, among the most successful among their peers. These include the Erie Family Health Center, Bickerdike Redevelopment Corporation, and the Erie Elementary Charter School.

Born in Chicago's 33rd year as a city, **Erie Neighborhood House** has witnessed its home town prosper through the contribution of five generations of immigrants, who came here seeking a better life. Few institutions have had such a view from the same address for 150 years. But it was not just a passive witness. When neighbors were tired and hungry, Erie House fed them, not just with food-with knowledge. Through education Erie House empowered their neighbors to become citizens who take that privilege seriously. Numerous volunteers from Presbyterian churches throughout Chicagoland, motivated by the social gospel, came to Erie House to give and were constantly amazed at how much they received, because a settlement house fosters reciprocity.

Dutch, Norwegian, German Polish, Italian, African American, Puerto Rican, or Mexican—you were welcome at Erie House. From preschooler to elder, you had a second home there. How Erie House and so many immigrants and migrants struggled and prospered together is the story that unfolds in *A Neighbor Among Neighbors*, marking Erie's 150 years as a "home with no borders."

PIANO LESSONS

(True story by Mildred Honor, former elementary school music teacher, Des Moines, IA)

I had supplemented my income by also teaching piano lessons for over 30 years. During those years, I found that children have many levels of musical ability, and even though I have never had the prodigy, I have taught some very talented students. However, I have also had my share of what I call "musically challenged pupils"!

One such pupil being Robby, an 11 year old when his mother (a single mom) dropped him off for his first piano lesson. I prefer that students (especially boys) begin at an earlier age, which I explained to Robby. But Robby said that it had always been his mother's dream to hear him play the piano, so I took him as a student.

At the end of each weekly lesson he would always say "my mom's going to hear me play someday". But to me, it seemed hopeless; he just did not have any inborn ability. I only knew his mother from a distance as she dropped Robby off or waited in her aged car to pick him up. She always waved and smiled, but never dropped in. Then one day Robby stopped coming for his lessons. I thought about calling him, but assumed that because of his lack of ability he had decided to pursue something else. I was also glad that he had stopped coming. He was a bad advertisement for my teaching! Several weeks later I mailed a recital flyer to the students' homes. To my surprise, Robby (who



had received a flyer) asked if he could be in the recital. I told him that the recital was for current pupils and that because he had dropped out, he really did not qualify.

He told me that his mother had been sick and unable to take him to his piano lessons, but that he had been practicing. "Please Miss Honor, I've just got to play," he insisted. I don't know what led me to allow him to play in the recital perhaps it was his insistence or maybe something inside of me saying that it would be all right.

The night of the recital came and the high school gymnasium was packed with parents, relatives and friends. I put Robby last in the program, just before I was to come up and thank all the students. I thought any damage he might do would come at the end of the program and I could always salvage his poor performance through my 'Curtain Closer'.

Well the recital went off without a hitch, the students had been practicing and it showed. Then Robby came up on the stage. His clothes were wrinkled and hair messy. I thought "Why isn't he dressed up like the other students? Why didn't his mother at least make him comb his hair for this special night?"

Robby pulled out the piano bench, and I was surprised when he announced that he had chosen to play Mozart's Concerto No. 21 in C Major. I was not prepared for what I heard next. His fingers were light on the keys, and they even danced nimbly on the ivories. Never had I heard Mozart played so well by anyone his age.

After six and a half minutes, he ended in a grand crescendo, and everyone was on their feet in wild applause!!! Overcome and in tears, I ran up on stage and put my arms around Robby in joy.

"I have never heard you play like that, Robby, how did you do it?" Through the microphone Robby explained: "Well Miss Honor, Remember I told you that my mom was sick? Well, she actually had cancer and passed away this morning. And well...she was born deaf, so tonight was the first time she had ever heard me play, and I wanted to make it special."

There wasn't a dry eye in the house that evening. As people from Social Services led Robby from the stage to be placed into Foster care, I noticed that even their eyes were red and puffy. I thought to myself then how much richer my life had been for taking Robby as my pupil. He had taught me the meaning of Perseverance and Love and Believing in Yourself, and maybe even taking a chance on someone and you didn't know why.

(Robby was killed years later in the senseless bombing at the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City in April 1995.)
